Our Club was founded in 1990, spearheaded by two very dynamic women, Alma Wilson and Norah Egener. Our charter was awarded in August 1991 at the national annual general meeting in Toronto. We were the 135th club in Canada at that time.

### **ADVOCACY**

Our Advocacy Committee is always eager to take on the world! We must, however, focus on and prioritize only those things that we can manage with a small group.

The first Committee meeting of the year was held on August 19<sup>th</sup>. We continue to work on Ageing in Place and are planning a policy resolution for Ontario Council for the 2025 Annual Meeting. As many may remember, we also were working on a similar resolution for CFUW National. We did contribute recommendations to a resolution that went forward through the National Advocacy Committee. Some of our recommendations were accepted and that resolution was approved at the July 2024 Annual Meeting in Edmonton. We are pleased that we were able to have some influence on this very important issue.

We are working on another project to develop a document on resources for those aging in place. There is a definite dearth of current materials and resources that are readily available to people on how to navigate and access supports. We hope to create a current document that would be available in print and electronic forms for Owen Sound and area. We believe that this is important and necessary work for our committee.

Our thanks go to Donna Phillips, Judy Thomson and Jan Middleton for keeping our history alive. It seems appropriate, in this monthly column, to share with you, especially newer members, some of the highlights of this treasure trove of information as we celebrate our 34<sup>th</sup> year. Here is a glimpse into what our Club members have accomplished, and the dedicated women who have helped us grow and evolve... 30+ years later.

### From the Desk of the Archivist...

The history of our Club is fascinating in terms of our Club's members, accomplishments and special events. As Archivist for the past three years, I have thoroughly enjoyed researching, going through materials and recounting the history of our Club.

This month we will reminisce the year 2016 – 2017.

Meran Farmer (yours truly) had the privilege of being President for this year and also the next year! Ruth Henderson was Past President; Trish Searle: Treasurer; Judy Thomson: Membership Chair; Judy Mapleson: Program Chair; Loreen Cumming and Donna Phillips: Website Co-Chairs.

The highlights of the year included a very successful fundraising event featuring Ted Barris, author and journalist, in May 2017 when he presented his book: *The Great Escape: The Untold Story*.

This year, we had 43 returning members plus 8 new members. Judy Campbell and Styn Furness joined us. Marg Howard became a dual member joining both CFUW North York and our Club.

Monthly meeting attendance averaged 25 members.

We had a Healthy Lifestyles Group headed by Loreen Cumming who arranged, among many activities, Yoga and Zumba classes and a Coffin Ridge Winery Walk and wine tasting!

Our Issues Group spent an enormous amount of time researching and presenting to the Club, the issues surrounding the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Report.

The Gardening Group had 15 happy gardeners who enjoyed speakers Audrey Armstrong and Bill Moses, and also presented gardening issues at one of our general meetings, where they dressed in their gardening garb. Most interesting and entertaining!

The Art Explorers headed by Eleanor Huff, had a great time exploring galleries like the Tom Thomson, Intersections Wood Gallery and Grey Roots.

The Book Club donated 54 books written by Indigenous writers, valued at \$1,000 to the elementary school at Cape Croker. They also raised \$200 at a book sale at one of our general meetings.

A Games Group met monthly to play a variety of games, socialize, eat and generally have fun.

The newly formed Yarn Group (Knitwits) met monthly to socialize and work on their individual projects. Our Club also approved the Outreach proposal of Donna Elliott's idea to support and become involved in a partnership with the Nawash Band at Cape Croker to produce a play depicting the history of the Chippewas of Nawash.

The Club agreed to host an upcoming Fall Gathering and six enthusiastic volunteers headed by Brenda Bergen started work on that event.

Due to weather uncertainties in the month of January, it was decided to not have a general meeting that month and to add a meeting in August.

### ARCHIVES, continued

In June, President Meran Farmer, Judy Gay, Judy Thomson and Ruth Henderson attended the National Annual General Meeting at Brock University, St. Catharines, Ontario. Our Club was given an award for a 26% increase in Membership (second year in a row for this Award!) Judy Gay expertly presented a Resolution from our Club, "A Resolution to Strengthen the Regulations of the Pest Management Review Agency, Health Canada". You can imagine how delighted we all were when our Resolution was passed by the delegates!



And lastly, our Scholarship Program awarded four scholarships to deserving female students: three \$1,500 and one \$1,000.

### **EDUCATION**

Over the summer I submitted the Scholarship Fund's annual filing to the Canada Revenue Agency. I also met with Stuart Reid from the Community Foundation. This year's disbursement from our fund held there is \$2,982. At the September 3rd executive committee meeting we passed a motion to supplement this by \$1,018. That brings the total to \$4,000, which will cover four \$1,000 scholarships.

The terms of our agreement at the Community Foundation have been revised. In addition to providing scholarships, we can now also direct funds to a Canadian registered charity that has education in its purposes (e.g., Scientists in School).

The Executive also passed a motion to approve donating \$1,575 to Scientists in School. This will cover the cost of 5 STEM lessons. We have asked that this donation be directed to Alexandra Community School.

As always, the generous donations made by our members to CFUW's Education Fund (on the membership registration form or to our treasurer at any time) are essential to our Club's ability to fund scholarships to young women, and are greatly appreciated.


We all seem to love going for lunch at Legacy Ridge, so we've planned to do just that on **December 10** for our Christmas get-together.




